- 1. The phrase Jesus says most often to his disciples in his first appearances to them after the resurrection is "Peace be with you." (See John 20:19, 21, 26. Luke 24:36. In Matt 28:10 "Do not be afraid.").
 - A) Why do you think he greeted them that way? What did he mean by it?
 - B) Close your eyes for a minute and hear Jesus speak those words to you. (Try hearing it as a sentence, or slowly, one word at a time.) Notice how your heart responds.
- 2. John 20:21 records that when the risen Jesus appeared to the disciples in the locked room, he gave them a mission, saying, "As the Father has sent me, so I send you." Reflect on what you know about God's act of sending Jesus (ex: John 3:16-17), and what "so I send you" means now for us as followers of Jesus.
- 3. In 20:22, Jesus "breathed on them" (divine breath gives life; compare to Gen. 2:7) and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit." I'm not sure I had previously noticed that this appears to describe the giving of the Holy Spirit that Jesus had promised earlier (see John 14:15-17; 15:26). It made me wonder if this is the author of John's way of describing the event of Pentecost (which of course is described differently in the book of Acts). In any case, Jesus didn't just give believers a mission (20:21), he also gave them the Holy Spirit to empower and guide them in that mission. A) Talk about or describe how the Holy Spirit has enabled you to pursue God's mission. B) Recall a time when you felt the Holy Spirit guiding the life/ministry of Bethel.
- 4. If you were to paint a picture based on John 21:1-14, what aspect of the story would you want to highlight? What part of the story is your eye or heart drawn to? (For example, a facial expression or emotion, an action, certain objects, a word or phrase, etc.)
- 5. In the first days and weeks after the resurrection, Peter and the other disciples still feel some disorientation and confusion "now what?" It's human nature to want to return to what is familiar. Peter turns to his previous pattern of fishing. I've heard people (including myself) wonder when the unusual conditions we are in will end and things "get back to normal." I've also been reflecting a lot on what "normal" is for me and others, and wondering "which parts of normal are worth rushing back to" (a quote I referred to last Sunday). Perhaps simple living, generosity, deep listening, collaboration and restorative justice could become new norms in our community? Are there parts of what is considered 'normal' (personally, or in church, or in society) that should change? That you'd be willing to let go of? What new norms do you feel called to help create?
- 6. The disciples fished all night but caught nothing. In the morning, Jesus said to them, "Cast the net to the right side of the boat, and you will find some." (21:6). What the disciples were doing wasn't working for who knows what reason! Jesus invited them to try a different way. Have you ever heard Jesus tell you to do something differently? For example, to try a new approach to a problem? Or to see a different perspective on a situation or scripture passage? Was that easy or difficult for you? Why? What was the result?
- 7. Imagine yourself sitting around the fire having breakfast with Jesus (John 21:12-13). What do you learn or observe about the character of Jesus/God in this scene?

Affirmation of faith – Philippians 2:5-11

Have the same frame of mind in you that was also in Christ Jesus.

He existed in the form of God,

but he did not consider equality with God something to exploit.

Instead he emptied himself, assuming the form of a slave.

He was born in the image of a human being;

and being found in the design of a human being, he humbled himself, and he became obedient unto death, even death on a cross.

Therefore God lifted him high

and granted freely to him the name above every name,

so that in the name of Jesus every knee would bend, in heaven, on earth, under the earth,

and every tongue consent that Jesus Christ is Lord – to the glory of God the Father.³
