



Sabbatical Review

This summer my family and I were very blessed and are very thankful to have had a family renewal sabbatical. In the midst of my weekly ministry responsibilities, evenings at home with the family can be a rarity and times to worship with my family without other responsibilities are few and far between. Many people tell us to take advantage of this time while our children are young because it goes by so quickly, and we do make intentional choices to work at that. Yet this extended, focused time is something that our family will always have to help carry us through the more hectic times in ministry that come with the territory.

That is why I made my primary goal for this season spending time with family. So often when the kids ask to do something, I say, “no, “not right now,” or “maybe another time.” During my sabbatical, I said “yes” or “in a minute” and stuck to that. We went fishing, camping, hiking, rode bikes, played games, and went to various places. After all how can I be an effective minister of the Word, if in the process I leave my family behind in shambles?

My secondary goal was rest and renewal for myself. As an introvert who is called to minister in settings that require “extroverted energy,” my batteries can easily

run low at times. On top of that, I live in a family of extroverts (yes, I would even say that our 10 month old is already an extrovert). In many ways this is a wonderful blessing. At the same time, it also means that family life does not leave much space to recharge. I’m sure that many of you either experience similar realities or “remember those days” too. So within this extended time with family, I also had two weeks, one at the beginning and one at the end of the summer, in which I spent time in silence and solitude. From those times, I was reenergized to more fully engage with my family and now with the ministry that God has called me to at Bethel.

Looking back, these were the goals that I needed to accomplish at this time in my journey; and I believe that I did so. And yet, it was a challenge at times as a very task oriented, goal setting individual not to be taken in by everything else that I could have accomplished with 3 months of “unstructured time.” Many of those things would have been very good and beneficial, and yet they are also things that I can do later or that have limited application. While spending time with my family and resting was planting seeds that I trust will lead to a fruitful harvest in the months and years to come. As such, the other goals that I had became “icing on the cake,” if I did anything with them at all.

During the summer a group of 20-30 people from high school to senior citizens, met in the fellowship room each Sunday for the intergenerational SS class. The first Sunday we discussed the themes from the Minor Prophet sermon and Bible study series. It appears that we could say the message of the prophets and Jesus could be summed up in Micah's words asking, "What more could be asked of us, but to act justly, love mercy, and walk humbly with your God," and the words of Jesus when he said "Love God and Love your neighbor." Each Sunday after this first session we listened to what some modern day prophets are saying. As we watched DVDs with Max Lucado, Shane Clairborne, June Alliman Yoder, Mandy Yoder Schrock, and Al Gore, we heard the same themes that we heard from the Old Testament prophets and Jesus. Each of these prophets, in their own way and in different situations, encouraged us to give hope to those who are suffering in the world. As we listened to these messages, we discussed how we might respond at Bethel and in our community. We also talked about how people of faith should (or should not) speak to the government relating to these issues. The class represented different ideas, and it was good to listen to thoughts, feelings, and ideas that might be different from our own. Perhaps this was the most exciting aspect of our summer series—being able to enter into dialogue with our brothers and sisters in a non-traditional group. Reflections on VBS: Take me to the Water By Beth Maurer, VBS Director

Vacation Bible School at Bethel Mennonite Church is not your typical VBS. Perhaps that is why I love it so much. As I think back on the week of June 11-15, I am struck by how unusual and unique Bethel's VBS is from many other churches. I am inspired by the focus that our congregation places not just on organizing and holding VBS for Bethel's children and youth, but also how our VBS fills other needs. Looking back I see the way VBS at Bethel draws past Bethel members home. Many of the kids that attended VBS this year were the children of Bethelites that have moved into other areas and sometimes even other states. For the past 4 years that I have helped and lead VBS I have watched grandchildren and children of extended Bethel members be nurtured and grow thanks to Bethel's VBS. So often I hear the cry that young people are leaving our churches and not returning. VBS seems to draw Bethelites home, if even for a short time. I have also been blessed to see our VBS fill the need of congregations that do not have the resources to support their own VBS. This year we had children from at least two Mennonite congregations attend Bethel's VBS because their church was not having vacation bible school, and their families wanted their children to experience VBS from a Mennonite perspective. Some may wonder if VBS still has a role to fill at Bethel. I say yes! Perhaps we need to remember to look outside of the box and allow God to work in all of the wonderful ways that God can. We heard many stories from parents about how much they appreciated the camp and how their youth were enjoying it. Youth (and coaches) enjoyed the popsicle break each evening and the ice cream celebration the last night of camp.

Intergenerational Montreal Service Trip

13 from Bethel attended the service trip up north June 22-30. With a home base at the MCC house in Montreal, the group served at multiple locations. At Casa C.A.F.I they rearranged office space, painted a large shelving unit, and set up for a sale they were having. At Chambre Clerc, a housing development/program for homeless people struggling with addiction, they cleaned the common living spaces (i.e. the bathrooms and kitchens). At Maison de L'Amitié (House of Friendship) they pulled weeds out of flower beds, hauled the weeds to composting areas, built a planter box, moved bricks, making signs for farmer's market, and walking/biking around with those signs to advertise for farmer's market.

Some of the interesting people they

interacted with included two ladies who were Hispanic immigrants to Montreal at CASA C.A.F.I. One of the leaders at Chambre Clerc had a background in computers, but wanted to work with the agency so as to help make a difference.

This trip wasn't just about service. As an intergenerational group, the trip offered an opportunity for shared experiences and bonding within Bethel family. During free time, the group hiked to a city overlook, attended the national celebration on Jean Baptist Day and Jazz Festival, saw the exact replica of Notre Dame, played card games, went to a Montreal Impact soccer game, and saw Niagara Falls on the way home.

This leads to another huge theme: FEAR. We must let go of our fears and allow God to use us as instruments of peace. As we do this we will find that we are transformed through the intersections of interaction that we have with those around us. Finally, there is always the balance between being and doing. By this I mean that as we allow ourselves to be transformed by God's presence, we must then turn around and live out this transformation and share it. Now I recognize that the being and doing cannot be easily divided and often times flow into each other, yet we cannot emphasize one to the exclusion of the other.

As I look back on this summer, I pray that we can continue to build on what God is doing here at Bethel. Let us not settle for complacent comfort. Let's stand up and walk after our Lord. Let's seek God's peace and pursue it!

As you may have read in my blog, <http://thequest.blogspot.com> (which is still available), I also did “do” a number of things. I read (including our congregational history), exercised, gardened and worked on scripture memory. All of these things were good, but all of these things are also a danger to me in my life as a “doer” if they get out of balance. I am a person who tends to gain a sense of self worth from accomplishing things. While God does call us to do things and it is important to put our faith into action, God also calls us to “be,” to “be still and know that God is God,” to dwell in the love of God that we receive because of who we are as God’s creation, rather than because we have earned it. God calls us to receive our pri-

mary sense of self worth from Him, rather from what we do or what we have or who we know.

As we enter into another church year and as we prepare to focus more deeply on our congregational vision with the Five Practices of Fruitful Congregations study, I invite each one of us to consider, as honestly as possible, where is it that we get our sense of self worth from. Is it from God our creator, or from some other external reality? And are we spending out time on the things of life that really matter or on superficial realities that are like the earthly treasures that moth and rust destroy (Matt 6:19-21).

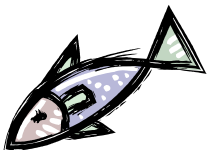
Maurer Family Reflects on the Summer

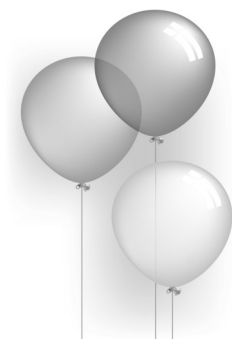
